
HATE CRIME FROM 2007-2016

All law enforcement agencies, district attorneys, and elected city attorney's offices in California, in partnership with the Department of Justice, have developed local data collection programs and submit hate crime statistics annually. These statistics include the number of hate crime events, hate crime offenses, victims of hate crimes, and suspects of hate crimes. This page presents an analysis of the number and types of hate crimes over the past decade.


Highlights:

- The number of hate crime events increased 11.2 percent from 837 in 2015 to 931 in 2016. However, the total number of hate crimes has decreased 34.7 percent from 2007 to 2016.
- Hate crimes with a racial bias are most common, accounting for 57.0 percent of all hate crime events since 2007, followed by hate crimes with a sexual orientation bias, at 22.5 percent, and those with a religion bias, at 17.9 percent.
- In 2016, 64.5 percent of hate crimes were violent crime offenses and 35.0 percent were property crime offenses.


HATE CRIME EVENTS BY TYPE OF BIAS 2007-2016




2016 HATE CRIME EVENTS BY BIAS MOTIVATION
